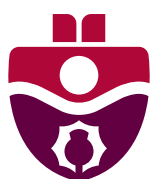

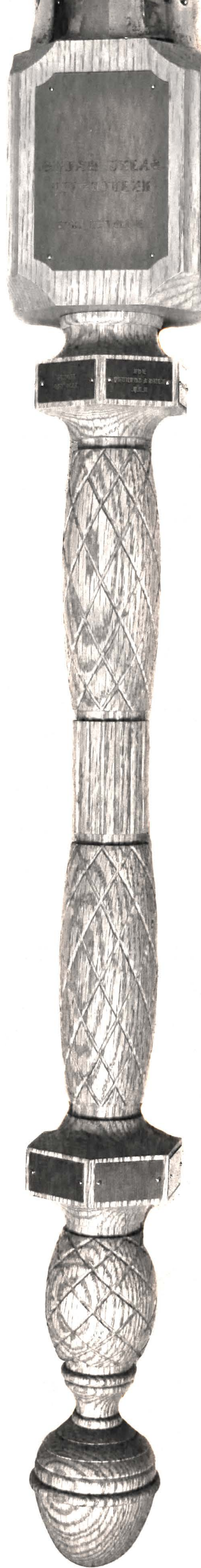

The Ceremonial Mace

The ceremonial mace, carried by the Marshal of Convocation, was presented to Saint Mary's University in 1980. It symbolizes the University's authority to grant degrees and is a gift from Maritime Command in honour of alumni killed in both world wars. The mace also recognizes serving members of the Canadian Armed Forces who have been students at Saint Mary's.

The mace is made of oak with a cast brass crown and brass plates carrying traditional ceremonial engravings; the plates represent the contributions to Saint Mary's by the Jesuit Fathers, the Christian Brothers of Ireland, the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Halifax-Yarmouth, the LaSalle Christian Brothers, the Lay Teachers and the Armed Forces.

Flags on the Stage



The flags which you see displayed on the stage

for Convocation are from the countries representing our graduating students. The globalization of the Saint Mary's University community is a feature of justifiable pride which contributes markedly to the growth and understanding of both Canadian and non-Canadian students.

Included in the University's permanent collection of flags is one from the International Year of the Disabled signifying the University's commitment to people with disabilities. The Mi'kmaq flag is an important part of this collection in recognition of their First Nation's Status. The University's Bicentennial flag was made a part of our permanent collection in 2002.



Academic Hoods

Graduates and members of the academic procession are attired in the basic elements of formal academic dress, which follow general guidelines established at England's Oxford and Cambridge Universities. It consists of the academic robe, hood and mortar board (at Saint Mary's, the latter is limited to Master's graduates).

The academic hood symbolizes the degree into which each graduate has been admitted, its outer edge trimmed with a colour to indicate a particular Faculty and degree: white symbolizes Arts; gold, Science; grey, Commerce, and green for Environmental Studies. Bachelor-level hoods are lined with satin in the colours of the institution granting the degree. Hence at Saint Mary's, they are maroon satin with a white chevron. The Master's hood is lined with maroon satin only, giving it added distinction.

President's Award for Excellence in Research

Dr. Jacob Hanley

Professor, Department of Geology



As a global leader in the field of geochemistry and mineral resource geology, Dr. Jacob Hanley's research conducted on campus at Saint Mary's and nationally and internationally has been an influential force for faculty, students, industry partners and the scientific community.

Always happy to mentor the next generation of researchers, Dr. Hanley has supervised more than 50 BSc honours theses and graduate theses at SMU, with alumni moving on to successful careers in industry, government and academia. His lab's active, varied research scope includes considerable student involvement, many industry and government funding sources, and spans a continent and centuries of data.

In a partnership with the Nova Scotia Museum, Dr. Hanley is currently engaged in an interdisciplinary collaboration with archaeologists, geochemists, and community members that may rewrite the understanding of pre-contact copper trade across North America. Using the chemical composition of copper from protohistoric sites in Nova Scotia, this research group is also tracking copper from its place of origin in 16th and 17th century Swedish mines to the Maritimes Basin of Canada, where it was repurposed by Indigenous peoples.



President's Award for Excellence in Research

Dr. Jacob Hanley

Professor, Department of Geology

Another major research theme focuses on the geochemical origin of deposits of critical metals such as tin, tungsten, cobalt and lithium. Dr. Hanley's team has developed ways of measuring concentrations of these metals at their source, deep in the Earth's crust, by analyzing microscopic samples of trapped magma in crystals that are transported to surface during eruption. The supply of these metals is threatened, a concern that Canada has recognized as they are essential to national economic security and the transition to a low-carbon economy.

Recognized for his research excellence, Dr. Hanley has won national awards, contributed to dozens of peer-reviewed publications and has received significant research funding, including \$2.6 million as Principal Investigator from industry and government sources.

His career has already been exceptionally productive, creative, and influential and we anticipate even more interesting work from him as his career progresses.

Dr. Hanley earned his PhD in Geology from the University of Toronto, where he also earned a Bachelor of Applied Science (Honours) in Mining Engineering and a Master of Science (Geology). Now a full tenured professor, he has held increasingly senior faculty roles in the Department of Geology at Saint Mary's since 2007.

The President's Award for Excellence in Research honours continued exceptional contributions to research and scholarship conducted by a full-time Saint Mary's University faculty member. More information can be found at smu.ca/fgsr/presidents-award.

Elissa Asp



Elissa Asp is currently a retired Professor of English and Linguistics at Saint Mary's University, Halifax, and Adjunct Professor in the Department of Psychology & Neuroscience, Faculty of Graduate Studies, Dalhousie University. Her current research interests include elaborating the discourse correlates of age-associated neurodegenerative disorders, neuroimaging studies of networks supporting language and discourse production, and theoretical implications of these for models of language. She taught courses in English and in the Linguistics program and contributes to undergraduate and graduate thesis supervision in English, Linguistics, and Psychology.

Elissa studied at York University where she specialized in linguistic descriptions of English and discourse, and in linguistic theory. She completed her doctoral dissertation *Natural Language and Human Semiosis: a sociocognitive account of metaphor* in 1993 and accepted a position in the English Department at SMU in September 1994. In the spring of 1995, she became the linguistics co-ordinator at SMU. Initially in that role, she worked with colleagues to set up and co-ordinate the only full undergraduate program in linguistics in the Maritimes. The program was formally approved in 1998 and continues to offer linguistics for students today. Elissa served as its co-ordinator until 2018, with occasional breaks to serve as chair of English (2001-2004) and for sabbaticals. The role of co-ordinator/chair enabled her to serve in many ways (on many committees) in the university and to advise Linguistics and English students on their academic programs. While all types of service in the university are important, Elissa most enjoys

student advising as it provides an opportunity both to get to know students individually and help them identify their goals and pathways to realising them.

Elissa classifies herself as a 'general linguist', interested in all aspects of language and language use, and in theoretical and practical applications of linguistics. She is particularly interested in the relationships between language use (language as social interaction) and the neural and cognitive systems that support it. Her work engages ethnographic, semiotic, neural and cognitive perspectives on language applied in diverse areas such as forensic linguistics, literary stylistics, critical discourse analysis, clinical linguistics, and broadly the description of English dialect and functional varieties.

These broad interests and her 'background training' in the systematic linguistic description of English language texts, discourse and varieties have allowed her to collaborate with colleagues not only in linguistics but in psychology, neurosciences, computer sciences, and medicine and are reflected in her research and considerable number of publications which range over all these areas. That background training, together with her research and publications also enabled her to develop and teach a very wide range of courses over the years, a task which she saw as one of the ways she could contribute to the learning opportunities for students at SMU. In retirement, she continues her research, editorial, and writing activities, and happily helps with thesis advising supervision and refereeing for former students.



Professor Emeritus Chankon Kim



Chankon (PhD, Indiana University at Bloomington) was a marketing faculty member from 1997 to 2024. Before joining Saint Mary's, he was a tenured associate professor at Concordia University in Montreal. He also taught or conducted seminars at several universities, including Hanyang University in South Korea, the University of Los Andes in Colombia, the University of the West Indies in Trinidad, and Tianjin University in China.

Chankon's teaching and research interests focused on consumer behaviour and research methodology. Throughout his research career, he published 80 peer-reviewed articles in journals, conference proceedings, and edited books. His work appeared in several leading marketing journals, including the *Journal of Marketing Research*, the *Journal of the Academy of Marketing Science*, the *Journal of Business Research*, and the *European Journal of Marketing*.

Throughout his career, Chankon secured research grants totalling \$785,000, both individually and as part of teams, from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) and the Fonds pour la formation de Chercheurs et l'aide à la Recherche (FCAR). He reviewed papers for 15 different journals and served as an associate editor for the *Canadian Journal of Administrative Sciences* during the last four years of his career.



Professor Emeritus

Kevin Vessey



Dr. J. Kevin Vessey received his BSc and MSc from Dalhousie University and a PhD from Queen's University, Kingston, which was followed by a post-doctoral research position at North Carolina State University. He was a professor in the Plant Science Department at the University of Manitoba from 1989 to 2004. He joined Saint Mary's in 2005 as a Professor in the Biology Department and served until 2017 in the positions of Dean of Graduate Studies and Associate Vice-President. Over his career, he has taught courses in Crop and Plant Physiology, Agroecology, Plant Biology, and Research Application and Knowledge Transfer.

Dr. Vessey's research area is plant physiology, particularly the functional interactions between crop plants and beneficial micro-organisms, and the optimization of the growth of crops as biofuel feedstocks. He has published over 90 peer-reviewed scholarly articles and book chapters, has co-edited one book, and has been awarded two patents. He has trained 32 graduate students, post-doctoral fellows, and research associates, and supervised over 30 undergraduate students. Dr. Vessey has been a reviewer of scientific publications for more than 20 journals and was a Consulting and Associate Editor for the journal, *Plant and Soil*. He has reviewed grant applications for more than a dozen granting agencies across Canada and internationally. Dr. Vessey has collaborated with 18 different private-sector companies in his research program.

Kevin Vessey

Dr. Vessey was the first full-time Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies and Research and the first Associate Vice-President Research at Saint Mary's University. During his tenure in these positions, he facilitated a remarkable increase in the number of graduate programs and the amount of externally funded research grants at the University.

Dr. Vessey has extensive experience in the administration of research activities with organizations external to the University. He has served on the Governing Council and Executive Committee of the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC). He also served on NSERC's Committee on Discovery Research and Chaired NSERC's Joint Prizes Committee. He served on and Chaired two NSERC Grant Selection Committees. Dr. Vessey was a Task Force Leader within BioFuelNet, one of Canada's Networks of Centres of Excellence (NCE). He helped establish and was the President and Board Director of the Offshore Energy Technical Research Association, and was a Board Member of Springboard Atlantic Inc., Atlantic Canada's commercialization network. Dr. Vessey also served on the advisory committees of the Maritime Provinces Higher Education Commission, the Nova Scotia Health Research Foundation (as Chair) NSERC Atlantic (as Chair), the Nova Scotia Research and Innovation Trust, and Petroleum Research Atlantic Canada. Dr. Vessey helped found and was Chair of the Alliance of Canadian Comprehensive Research Universities (ACCRU), an organization of the Vice-Presidents Research from smaller and intermediate-sized universities across Canada.

In recognition of his research and service accomplishments, Dr. Vessey has received many awards, including the C.D. Nelson Award for outstanding contributions by a scientist to plant physiology in Canada, the Rh Institute Award in the Natural Sciences, the Certificate of Achievement from the Manitoba Network for Science and Technology, and the Dedicated Service Award from the Northeastern Association of Graduate Schools. He is ranked among the top 2% of the world's most highly cited scientists by Stanford University. Currently, Dr. Vessey is a finalist for the 2024 Professional of Distinction Award by the Discovery Centre, Halifax.

Sonja Novkovic



Sonja joined Saint Mary's University Economics Department in 1993. She developed and taught multiple courses at the undergraduate and graduate level, and supervised students in various programs including economics, international development studies, and management. Her research in comparative economic systems and workplace democracy lead to development of courses dealing with alternative theories of the firm, cooperative business models and systems. In 2003, she joined the first cohort of faculty teaching in the newly developed Master of Management, Co-operatives and Credit Unions (MMCCU) in the Sobey School of Business, a professional program catering to international students-working professionals in the co-operative sector and delivered fully online.

Sonja served at Saint Mary's in many capacities, including as the co-ordinator of the MMCCU and later the Academic Director of the International Centre for Co-operative Management, the post she continues to hold. Her research and writing, often through community-university research partnerships, resulted in invited talks, numerous journal publications and book chapters, 9 edited books, edited journals, and industry think pieces. Her latest research sets the stage for humanistic approach to enterprise governance theory and practice, including governance of co-operative business networks in the circular economy.



Professor Emerita Sonja Novkovic

She was appointed as Guest Professor at the University of Eastern Finland (2021-2023), Adjunct Professor at Dalhousie University (2003-2008) and is a Visiting researcher at the Institut International des coopératives Alphonse-et-Dorimène-Desjardins (IICADD) at HEC in Montreal. She further contributed to the academic community as President of the International Association for the Economics of Participation (IAFEP, 2002-2004), Vice-President of the Canadian Association for Studies in Co-operation (CASC, 2005-2008) and served as Chair of the International Co-operative Alliance Research Committee (ICA CCR, 2013-2021). She regularly organized and contributed to Scientific Committees of international conferences, workshops and symposia. In 2014, she established the Young and Emerging Scholars Network of the ICA CCR, significantly contributing to the growth of this field of research internationally.

With community engagement and knowledge mobilization high on her priorities list, she continues to serve in advisory roles to various international associations, boards and committees related to co-operative enterprise and the social economy.

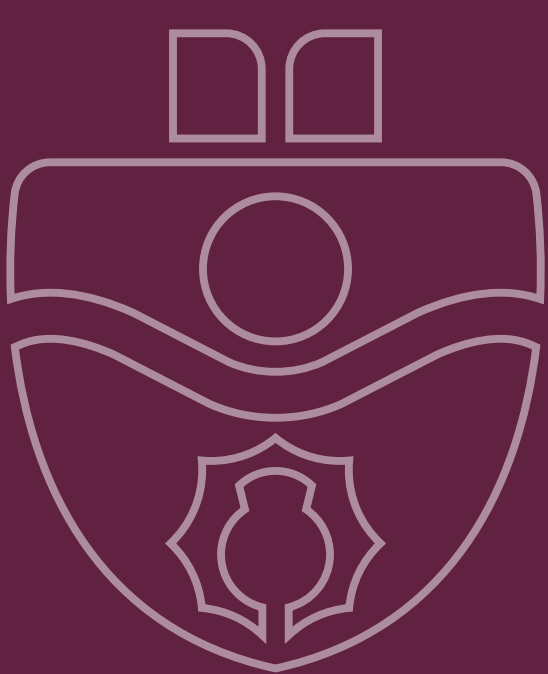

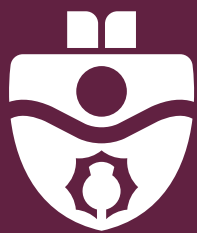
